I am carrying out a research study



What is a Research Study?

A research study is a way we try to find out answers to questions



This research study is about how we teach people about diabetes.

You have been invited to take part in My Diabetes and Me research study

I want to see if you would like to take part



Why are we doing this research?

We have developed an education programme to teach people with learning disabilities who have Type 2 diabetes, how to look after themselves.

We want to find out how well this programme works



The diabetes education programme is called DESMOND-ID

It is for people who have Type 2 diabetes and the people who support them (a family member, a carer, a partner or a friend)



This programme helps people:





To learn how to keep healthy and stay well

Why have you been invited?



We have invited you to take part in the research because you have Type 2 diabetes



We are asking you because someone like a nurse or a doctor has told us you might like to take part



Or, you or a person who supports you has said that we could contact you about the research

Do I have to take part?



You can choose

You can say YES or |NO



If you say YES, we will ask you to sign a piece of paper called a consent form

This form says you are happy to take part in the research study.



We will give you a copy of the form to keep

It is OK to change your mind.

If you say NO to taking part in the research study, nothing will change for you or the care you receive.



What will happen if I take part?

If you say yes, a research nurse will arrange to meet you at a place that you know



It is good to ask somebody who knows you well to be with you. This could be a family member, a carer, partner or a friend.



What will happen when the nurse visits you?

This appointment will be for about 2 hours. But the nurse may arrange a second visit

First we will explain about the research study



We will ask you to sign a piece of paper called a consent form. This is a form that says you are happy to take part in the research study.



We will ask you some questions about your life and your health

We will measure how tall you are and how much you weigh

We will measure your blood pressure. We may let your GP know your results



The nurse will also ask you to have a blood test

The blood test might hurt a little



The research nurses who will take your blood test are friendly. They will look after you

The blood will be tested later that day. This blood will be tested for Hb1Ac and cholesterol. We may let your GP know your results



We will also ask you to complete some forms asking about your health. The nurse or your family member, carer, partner or friend who you trust can help you with these forms. We may let your GP know your answers.

If you don't get these forms completed during this visit, the nurse can call out again to collect the forms

What will happen next?



If you agree to take part, you will be put into either Group 1 (Education programme) or Group 2 (Control group). This will be decided by chance or lucky dip



We will ask a computer to decide

We will let you know which group you are in











If you are in Group 1, what will happen?

If you are in Group 1, you and your family member, carer, partner or friend will be asked to attend 8 education sessions at one of several local venues in your own Health & Social Care Trust area.

These will last approx. 2 and a half hours per week

If you are in the Diabetes Education
Group we will send you information
about when it starts and where it will be
held

We would like you and your family member, carer, partner or friend to come to the sessions together, where possible

If you do not have someone to come with you, that's OK, you can still attend

We may also ask you to take part in a face to face or online focus group with other people who took part in the education programme, to tell us how it went



If you are in Group 2, what will happen?

If you are in Group 2, you will NOT be invited to the education sessions



We will send you a booklet on how to look after your diabetes

We will ask you to see your GP or nurse as usual



Other things you need to know?

We will ask you to see the research nurse again for 2 more appointments after 6 months, and after 12 months

This will be like the other appointments:

- We will ask you some questions
- We will measure you and
- We will ask you to have a blood test



Will I get paid for taking part?

To thank you for your time, we will give you a £10 gift voucher after the first visit at the start of the study. We will give you another £10 voucher at the other appointments after 6 months, and 12 months

We can help you with money for travel costs if needed





We will keep your information safe. We will not tell anyone else it is about you

We will not talk to anyone else unless we are worried about your safety



We may ask you if you will let us look at your medical notes to help us with this research study

We will also ask if you will let us look at this information in the future


We are the "data controllers" which means we have to make sure the information you give us is used in the right way

The government (Dept of Health) is paying for this research study




Who has checked this research?


Before we do a research study, it is checked by a Research Ethics Committee
